Wheels to Work



Will lives in Wirksworth and loans a moped from Wheels to Work to get to his Electrical Engineering Apprenticeship in Alfreton. He said that he couldn't get to his job without it as he starts at 6am. "It's really helped me out, and I love my job". Will is hoping to take out a loan with the Credit Union to buy the moped from the project at the end of his 6 month loan period in November.

- 43% of part-time workers earn less than the living wage
- 21% of households are in poverty
- 20% of employees are on low pay
- 18.2% of children in England are in poverty
- 10.4% of households in England are in fuel poverty
- 6.2 million people are under employed

- 25% of households are deprived
- 17% of children live in income deprived households
- 15% of children are eligible for free school meals
- 12.8% of households are in fuel poverty
- 12% of people are income deprived
- 9.8% of people claim out of work benefits



What is financial exclusion?

- Lack of access to appropriate financial services and products (eg bank accounts, affordable credit)
- Lack of knowledge, skills, confidence and motivation to manage money effectively.
- Low income households most likely to be affected
 - Lone parents
 - Long term unemployed or low paid
 - Long term sick or disabled
 - Lone pensioners, particularly widows
 - Households headed by students or part-time workers

How

- Delivery of half day training sessions developed by Keith Waters and Dr Ellen Townsend
- Open to all
- Raises awareness
- Challenges myths
- Increases understanding of risk factors
- Increases confidence to help those at risk

Outcomes

- Each seminar evaluated
- 99% would recommend to others
- 85% feel more confident about dealing with someone at risk
- Each trained person has supported average of 3.47 vulnerable people

Oil Buying Scheme

- Community Oil Buying Scheme began in October 2011
- Aims to help households, businesses and the wider community save money on heating oil
- Many areas of Derbyshire are off gas grid



How it works

- Membership based buying consortium
- Fee of £20 per year
- Orders collated and a bulk order is placed once a month
- Negotiate with suppliers for best price
- Members pay one price whether ordering 500 or 2000 litres of oil



NED activity

- 72 members across the period
- 33 free membership funded through WHHP
- Average saving £44 -£180 pa.
- Highest saving £324 p.a.





Community Buildings Advice

- A wide range of resources and publications
- Access to specialised legal advice on village hall issues
- Funding advice
- Energy advice
- Training



Managed by volunteers

- 80% of halls are held on charitable trusts and registered with the Charity Commission
- Halls are owned by the community
- Volunteers committee members are trustees of the hall
- Volunteers keep halls open and viable



Did you know that?

Halls underpin rural community life and

- 1/2 provide health and wellbeing services
- 1/3 are used for preschool and nurseries
- 3/4 are a venue for arts and cultural activities
- 3/4 provide access to sport
- 1/10 provide retail services
